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## Electromagnetic modeling of fiber-based composite structures

## Motivation

- Accurate computational models of complex anisotropic multilayered composite structures
- Robust, fast, end-user's friendly imaging procedures


## Forward modeling



Figure: Damaged structure with uniaxial dielectric (glass-based) or conductive (graphite-based) multilayers


Figure: The transformation between the local and global coordinates by rotation matrix

## EM response of anisotropic multilayers to distributed sources

## The state equation

$$
\frac{d}{d z} \bar{\varphi}(z)=\overline{\bar{A}}_{n} \cdot \bar{\varphi}(z)+\bar{f}(z)
$$

based on the 4-component vector:

$$
\bar{\varphi}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}, z\right)=\left[\begin{array}{l}
k_{x} \tilde{H}_{x}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}, z\right)+k_{y} \tilde{H}_{y}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}, z\right) \\
k_{y} \tilde{H}_{x}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}, z\right)-k_{x} \tilde{H}_{y}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}, z\right) \\
k_{x} \tilde{E}_{x}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}, z\right)+k_{y} \tilde{E}_{y}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}, z\right) \\
k_{y} \tilde{E}_{x}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}, z\right)-k_{x} \tilde{E}_{y}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}, z\right)

## The solution of the state equation

$$
\bar{\varphi}\left(d_{n+1}\right)=e^{\overline{\bar{A}}_{n}\left(\delta_{n}\right)} \cdot \bar{\varphi}\left(d_{n}\right)+\int_{d_{n}}^{d_{n+1}} e^{\overline{\bar{A}}_{n}\left(\delta_{n}^{\prime}\right)} \cdot \bar{f}\left(z^{\prime}\right) d z^{\prime}
$$

## EM response of anisotropic multilayers to distributed sources

## The new recurrence equation :

$$
\bar{\varphi}\left(d_{n}\right)=\overline{\bar{\Omega}}_{n} \cdot\left[\begin{array}{l}
\alpha_{n} \\
\beta_{n}
\end{array}\right]
$$

New recurrence relations based on the propagator matrix method

- To efficiently calculate the spectral response of the laminate
- Capable of stably dealing with distributed source along z
- More efficient compared to the traditional Green's function method
- To numerically solve the state equation containing the tangential components of the fields


## Two methods for calculating the scattered field

## $1^{\text {st }}$ method

- Induced current integral equation (ICIE)
- windowing technique
- Padua interpolation-integration technique
$2^{\text {nd }}$ method
- Lippman-Schwinger integral formula
- Polarization tensor
- Padua interpolation-integration technique

## Discretization of the integral equation - $1^{\text {st }}$ method

## Induced current integral equation (ICIE)

$$
\overline{\bar{\chi}}(\mathbf{r}) \cdot \mathbf{E}^{i n c}(\mathbf{r})=\frac{\mathbf{I}(\mathbf{r})}{-i \omega \epsilon_{0}}-\overline{\bar{\chi}}(\mathbf{r}) \cdot i \omega \mu_{0} \int \overline{\bar{G}}\left(\mathbf{r} ; \mathbf{r}^{\prime}\right) \cdot \mathbf{I}\left(\mathbf{r}^{\prime}\right) d \mathbf{r}^{\prime}
$$

## By MoM

## By fast Fourier transform (FFT)

$$
\overline{\bar{\xi}}_{v \kappa ; p ; p^{\prime}}=\sum_{m^{\prime}, n^{\prime}} \eta_{v \kappa ; p ; p^{\prime} ;\left(m-m^{\prime}\right),\left(n-n^{\prime}\right)} I_{m^{\prime}, n^{\prime}, p^{\prime}}^{(\kappa)}=\operatorname{IFFT}\left\{\operatorname{FFT}\left\{\overline{\bar{\eta}}_{v \kappa ; p ; p^{\prime}}\right\} \otimes \mathrm{FFT}\left\{(0) \overline{\bar{I}}_{p^{\prime}}^{(\kappa)}\right\}\right\}
$$

## The techniques for calculating the impedance matrix - $1^{\text {st }}$ method

## The impedance matrix :

$$
\eta_{v \kappa ; p ; p^{\prime}}(x, y)=i \omega \mu_{0} \int_{\mathcal{D}} G_{v \kappa}\left[\left(x-x^{\prime}\right),\left(y-y^{\prime}\right) ; z_{p} ; z^{\prime}\right] \psi_{0,0, p^{\prime}}^{(\kappa)}\left(\boldsymbol{r}^{\prime}\right) d \boldsymbol{r}^{\prime}
$$

After detouring the integral path to avoid branch cuts or singularites for the integral involving $\widetilde{\eta}_{v \kappa ; p ; p^{\prime}}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}\right)$, the DFT of $\overline{\bar{\eta}}_{v \kappa ; p ; p^{\prime}}^{\prime}$ (the windowed version of $\left.\overline{\bar{\eta}}_{v \kappa ; p ; p^{\prime}}\right)$ can be constructed as

## 2-D Hamming window

## Padua interpolation-integration technique - calculating fast oscillating integrals

- The goal is to compute the I-FT of fast oscillating spectrum in the $k_{x}-k_{y}$ plane

$$
G(x, y)=\frac{1}{4 \pi^{2}} \iint_{-\infty}^{\infty} \tilde{G}_{0}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}\right) e^{\left(i k_{x} x+i k_{y} y\right)} \mathrm{d} k_{x} \mathrm{~d} k_{y}
$$

- Interpolation of the non-oscillating part at the Padua points with Chebyshev's polynomial interpolant

$$
\mathcal{L}_{n} \tilde{G}_{0}\left(k_{x}, k_{y}\right)=\sum_{k=0}^{n} \sum_{j=0}^{k} c_{j, k-j} \hat{T}_{j}\left(k_{x}\right) \hat{T}_{k-j}\left(k_{y}\right)-\frac{1}{2} c_{n, 0} \hat{T}_{n}\left(k_{x}\right) T_{0}\left(k_{y}\right)
$$

with weights $c_{j, k-j}$ computed using ${ }^{2}$

- Fourier transform of Chebyshev polynomials given by

$$
\int_{-1}^{1} \hat{T}_{n}\left(k_{x}\right) \exp \left(-i k_{x} x\right) \mathrm{d} k_{x}
$$

are managed using ${ }^{3}$

## Padua interpolation-integration technique - calculating fast oscillating integrals

Alternative representation as self intersections and boundary contacts of the generating curve $\gamma(t)=(-\cos ((n+1) t),-\cos (n t), t \in[0, \pi])$


Figure: The Padua points with their generating curve for $n=12$ (left, 91 points) and $n=13$ (right, 105 points), also as union of two Chebyshev-Lobatto sub-grids (red and blue bullets). Image taken from ${ }^{5}$

## Fast calculation of EM scattering problems - $2^{\text {nd }}$ method

## The Lippman-Schwinger integral formulation

$$
\mathbf{E}^{s c a}(\mathbf{r})=i \omega \mu_{0} \int \overline{\bar{G}}^{e e}\left(\mathbf{r}, \mathbf{r}^{\prime}\right) \cdot \overline{\bar{\chi}}\left(\mathbf{r}^{\prime}\right) \cdot \mathbf{E}^{t o t}\left(\mathbf{r}^{\prime}\right) \mathrm{d} \mathbf{r}^{\prime}
$$

where the contrast function

$$
\overline{\bar{\chi}}(\mathbf{r})=-i \omega \epsilon_{0} \cdot\left(\overline{\bar{\epsilon}}_{i}-\overline{\bar{\epsilon}}_{b}\right)
$$

$\overline{\bar{\epsilon}}_{i}$ is the permittivity tensor of an inclusion in the composite medium.
$\overline{\bar{\epsilon}}_{b}$ is the permittivity tensor of the composite medium in the global coordinate system.

## The incident field is defined as

$$
\begin{aligned}

& =i \omega \mu_{0} \overline{\bar{G}}^{e e}\left(\mathbf{r}, \mathbf{r}^{\prime}\right) \cdot \boldsymbol{\beta} \|
\end{aligned}
$$

## Asymptotic formulation with polarization tensor $-2^{\text {nd }}$ method

## The Lippman-Schwinger integral formulation

When permittivity tensor of the inclusion $\overline{\bar{\epsilon}}_{i}=\overline{\bar{I}}_{\epsilon_{i}}$ and its size is small enough, the scattered field can be derived into the asymptotic formulation.

$$
\mathbf{E}^{s c a}(\mathbf{r})=i \omega \mu_{0} \overline{\bar{G}}^{e e}\left(\mathbf{r}, \mathbf{r}_{m}\right) \cdot \overline{\bar{\varrho}} \cdot \mathbf{E}^{i n c}\left(\mathbf{r}_{m}\right)
$$

## The polarization tensor

The polarization tensor in the local coordinate for the inclusion with volume V is :

$$
\begin{array}{r}
\overline{\bar{\varrho}}=-i \omega \epsilon_{0} V \cdot\left[\begin{array}{ccc}
\alpha_{I} & 0 & 0 \\
0 & \alpha_{t} & 0 \\
0 & 0 & \alpha_{t}
\end{array}\right] \\
\alpha_{I}=\epsilon_{11} \frac{\epsilon_{i}-\epsilon_{11}}{\epsilon_{11}+L_{I}\left(\epsilon_{i}-\epsilon_{11}\right)} \\
\alpha_{t}=\epsilon_{22} \frac{\epsilon_{i}-\epsilon_{22}}{\epsilon_{22}+L_{t}\left(\epsilon_{i}-\epsilon_{22}\right)}
\end{array}
$$

- $L_{I}$ and $L_{t}$ are dependent on the shape of inclusion.
- For a cubic inclusion, $L_{I}=c \arctan (c / \sqrt{1+2 c})$ and $L_{t}=\left(1-L_{I}\right) / 2$, where $c=\epsilon_{11} / \epsilon_{22}{ }^{6}$.

## Comparison of the scattered field by MoM and COMSOL - $1^{\text {st }}$ Case

- freq=6 GHz
- $\overline{\bar{\epsilon}}_{2}=\epsilon_{0}$ diag $[3,2,2]$, rotation angle $\theta_{2}=30^{\circ}$
- $\overline{\bar{\epsilon}}_{3}=\epsilon_{0} \operatorname{diag}[4,2.5,2.5]$, rotation angle $\theta_{3}=60^{\circ}$

(a) Scattered electric fields along the $x$-axis.

(b) Scattered electric fields along the $y$-axis.

- $\mathrm{freq}=3 \mathrm{GHz}$
- $\overline{\bar{\epsilon}}_{1}=$
$\epsilon_{0}$ diag $[2+i 0.3,3+i 0.1,3+$
- rotation angle $\theta=60^{\circ}$
- 11 electric dipole sources with $x / y / z$ polarization
- a cubic air scatterer with side length $0.1 \lambda_{0}$


Figure: The scattered electric field with sources in $x / y / z$-polarization

## Comparison of the scattered field by MoM and asymptotic method - $3^{\text {rd }}$ Case



- freq $=3 \mathrm{GHz}$
- $d_{1}=0.5 \lambda_{0} ; d_{2}=0.2 \lambda_{0} ; d_{3}=0.35 \lambda_{0} ; d_{4}=0.2 \lambda_{0}$
- layer $1: \overline{\bar{\epsilon}}_{1}=\epsilon_{0}$ diag $[2+i 0.3,3+i 0.1,3+i 0.1]$; rotation angle $\theta_{1}=60^{\circ}$
- layer 2 :
$\overline{\bar{\epsilon}}_{2}=\epsilon_{0}$ diag $[4.5+i 0.2,6+i 0.05,6+i 0.05]$; rotation angle $\theta_{2}=45^{\circ}$
- 11 electric dipole sources with $\times$ polarization
- a cubic air scatterer with side length $0.1 \lambda_{0}$


Figure: The scattered electric field with the $x$-polarization source located at $\left(0,0,0.5 \lambda_{0}\right)$

## MUSIC (MUltiple SIgnal Classification) imaging method

## Singular value decomposition

$$
\mathbf{K}=\mathbf{U} \mathbf{S} \mathbf{V}^{*}
$$

- Multistatic response matrix $\mathbf{K}$ maps the currents at the source locations to the scattered fields measured at the detectors.
- Subspace is spanned by the singular vectors corresponding to different singular values.

Sources and receivers


Figure: Damaged structure with uniaxial dielectric (glass-based) or conductive (graphite-based) multilayers

## MUSIC (MUltiple SIgnal Classification) imaging method

## Formulations

Standard MUSIC imaging method ${ }^{8}$

$$
\phi(\mathbf{r})=\frac{1}{\sum_{\sigma_{j}<\sigma_{L}} \sum_{v=1}^{3}\left|\bar{u}_{j}^{*} \cdot \bar{G}_{v}(\mathbf{r})\right|^{2}}
$$

Enhanced MUSIC imaging method ${ }^{9}$

$$
\phi(\mathbf{r})=\frac{1}{1-\sum_{\sigma_{j}>\sigma_{L}}\left|\bar{u}_{j}^{*} \cdot \overline{\bar{G}}(\mathbf{r}) \cdot \bar{a}_{\text {test }}\right|^{2}}
$$

with

$$
\bar{a}_{\text {test }}=\underset{\bar{a}}{\arg \max } \frac{\sum_{\sigma_{j}>\sigma_{L}}\left|\bar{u}_{j}^{*} \cdot \overline{\bar{G}}(\mathbf{r}) \cdot \bar{a}\right|^{2}}{|\overline{\bar{G}}(\mathbf{r}) \cdot \bar{a}|^{2}}
$$

## Choice of $\sigma_{L}$

Exemple for two scatterers $T=10^{3}$

- $\sigma_{i}$ being ordered from the largest to the lowest value
- A threshold $T$ arbitrarily chosen

$$
\sigma_{L}=T \times \max _{i}\left(\sigma_{i}\right)
$$



## Configuration of interest


(a) Top view

(b) Side view

(c) 3 D view

Figure: Testing configuration

## Description of the configuration

Measurement configuration

- location of sources $=$ location of receivers ( $\mathrm{x} / \mathrm{y} / \mathrm{z}$ polarization)
- $N_{\text {receivers }}=13 \times 13$
- $z$ position of receivers: $0.5 \lambda_{0}$
- range of receivers in $x-y$ plane : $\left[-3 \lambda_{0}, 3 \lambda_{0}\right]$

Region of interest (ROI)

- $N_{\text {cells }}=21 \times 21 \times 21$
- range of ROI along $z:\left[-2.35 \lambda_{0},-0.35 \lambda_{0}\right]$
- range of ROI in $x-y$ plane : $\left[-\lambda_{0}, \lambda_{0}\right]$



## The $1^{\text {st }}$ case - one scatterer



Figure: Imaging results by MUSIC for noiseless case (left figure) and 30 dB noisy case (right figure)

## The $2^{\text {nd }}$ case - two scatterers

## Conclusions

## Achievements

- Generalized and complete formulation of EM response \& Green dyads for undamaged anisotropic multilayers (work at the whole range of frequency for all materials)
- Asymptotic formula-based calculation of EM response for 3-D damaged uniaxial multilayers


## Challenges

- To speed up the interpolation and integration for large source-receiver arrays
- To handle delaminations at the interfaces as thin planar defects
- To extend NdT to detecting larger defects by using MUSIC as the first localization tool for non-linearized procedures
- To check the size range of defects possibly detected by the first-order modeling
- To put more endeavor on experiments for practical applications
